Sexual Offences

Reference is made to your letter WCC 3040-1 (AAG) over WCC 3700-1 dated 13 Jun 57.

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The problem of dealing with homosexuals has been reviewed at various times at this Headquarters. It has been found undesirable to publish a policy which could apply to all cases except in so far as release is concerned. It is the considered view at this Headquarters that each case must be dealt with on an individual basis in so far as disciplinary or release action is concerned.

It is considered that as soon as a commanding officer is informed that a sexual offence has been committed or incidents involving sexual aberration are suspected, he should order an immediate investigation and, at the same time, notify the Area Commander or the General Officer Commanding the Command. When the investigation is completed, the Commanding Officer should then seek the direction of the Area Commander or the General Officer Commanding the Commander or the General Officer Commanding the Commander or the deneral Officer Commanding the Commander or the General Officer Commanding the Commander or the General Officer Commanding Officer should be carried out the deneral Officer Commander or the General Officer Should then seek the direction of the Area Commander or the General Officer Comm

For this reason, it is considered that perhaps your instruction is too detailed and attempts to legislate for too many contingencies. Since this type of case is comparatively rare, it is considered that the decision as to what action, including disciplinary, should be taken should be retained in the hands of an Area Commander or GOC. He will be in a better position to assess the requirement and implications. An instruction, therefore, might be sufficient if limited to the direction outlined in our para 3 coupled with a general statement as to the necessity of discretion and lack of publicity in dealing with these matters.

If, however, you feel that fuller instruction is necessary, your policy letter is, in general, acceptable, except:

- (a) no statement should be included that Army Headquarters has laid down that personnel involved in such acts must be released from the services; since we much policy has in fact bein laid down.
- (b) no suggestion should be included that army Headquarters has established a general policy that disciplinary action should not be taken. It is pointed out that homosexual practices and gross indecency are criminal offences and must not be condoned or even appear to be condoned;

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(c) investigation should be carried out by C Pro C, since they are, by training and experience, most fitted to this specialized task.

This matter is of general application across the country, and should be subject to as standard consideration as may be feasible. The general instructions outlined in paragraphs 3 and 4 above will, therefore, be imparted to other commands as required.
