 I was a member of the Canadian Armed Forces. I was taking my trades training at which time an offence was committed against me, Section 156, indecent assault on a male, and/or Section 157, acts of gross indecency of the Canadian Criminal Code. The acts included, grabbing me, they would take down pants and try to give me an erection, by showing me a picture of a nude lady. Other acts included, tying me to a bed and exposing my penis and pouring water on it. No to this, I was released.
 I told my platoon sergeant about this, and was told that he did not care. I wrote to the National Defense Headquarters. They told me that my letter did not contain no new information to allow a new investigation. The original investigation did not allow me to clear my name.
