Meeting re Justice Human Rights Discussion Paper, 21 November, 1980

Davey: Can't keep national security out of this discussion.

POLITICAL BELIEF

Discussion of merits of opinion/belief/creed vs political opinion

- better to narrow to political opinion (HRC view).

PSC (Chodos): concern that HRC second guessing existing redress procedure for PS.

HRC view: HR Act already exists - but says, exhaust other
mechanism before coming to HRC.

ND strongly against including opinion as a basic human right

- should not use international obligations as an argument.
- appeal to G in C should be final.
- concern re binding HRC guidelines.

International conventions do permit restrictions (NS, public order).

HRC would develop guidelines.

SG Correction Service: religion, political belief OK

but opinion: contrary to CS policy.

("right to escape")

Chairperson summing up: Justice will reflect

- how to balance human rights and security.
- how to honour international obligations and have adequate exceptions.

SECURITY CLEARANCES

TB: be sure to consider security clearance problems before going to Cabinet.

ND: HRC naturally prejudiced on side of human rights.

HRC: we have no interest in security risks. No wish to second guess re clearances, criteria.

- only interest: ensure there is an occupational requirement
 - : not operate in arbitrary fashion.
 - would refer security complaints to a tribunal or another body.
 - : HR Commissioner feels security clearances improperly used.

PSC: not just a security problem: other sensitive positions.

SEXUAL ORIENTATION

HRC: onus on employer to show there is bona fide job requirement

- : did a research project in private sector employers contacted none were negative about SO.
- ND: not just security: ND a closed society (e.g. ships) \ need to except some agencies not fight on case by case \ basis convince Cabinet obligation to parents "abnormal".

HRC: same situation as women a few years ago? ND: not yet. Correctional Services: problem re staff.

RCMP: paper should strengthen concern of RCMP and others

: Security Service troubled about being identified in HRC study

CRIMINAL AND PENAL CONVICTIONS

Immigration concern re excluding criminals from Canada

- would HRA have precedence?

DSS: problem re auditing service.

(DSS checks with professional associations)

 problem of Privacy Act violation of identifying persons with convictions.

HRC: must look at what convicted for - not just conviction
 (e.g. no problem about auditor if convicted for a
 traffic offence)

RCMP: re pardon.

Parole Board - must consider previous criminal record

- could be regarded as discriminatory.

Correctional Services: problems - prefer general exclusion.

AD: must reflect on exclusion by department.
